The green ballot paper is for the House of Representatives


The White ballot paper is for the Senate


## House of Representatives

The ballot paper will have the names of the different candidates standing in your electorate, next to an empty box.

There will also be a picture of the party's logo next to the empty box. If a candidate is not part of a party, it will say 'independent' underneath their name, and they will not have a party logo next to their empty box.

Number every box in order order of your favourite candidate to least favourite candidate

You should start by writing number 1 in the box next to the candidate who is your first choice. Then write number 2 in the box next to your second choice. Then write number 3 in the box next to your third choice. Continue numbering the boxes until you have filled out every box.

For your vote to be valid, make sure you:

- Do not write the same number twice.

- Do not skip numbers.
- Do not use ticks or crosses.
- Do not leave boxes blank.
- Do not write anything on the ballot paper that could identify who you are

You need to fill out ALL the empty boxes,
numbering each box in order of your favourite candidate to least favourite candidate.

## Senate

The ballot paper will have the names of the different parties standing in your state or territory written above the line, with a picture of their party's logo and an empty box.

Individual candidates standing for that party will be listed below the line.

If a group of candidates are not part of a party, they will not have a party logo or a party name. It may say 'independent' or nothing above the line, instead of a party name.

The ballot paper has a black line on it. Choose whether to vote above
the line or below the line. To make sure your vote counts, you must only mark boxes above the line OR below the line, NOT BOTH


## 2 Above the line

If you vote above the line, you will vote for a political party or group.

You must vote for at least 6 parties or groups, numbering them 1 to 6 in order of your preference. If there are less than 6 parties or groups standing, you must number all of them

3 Below the line
If you vote below the line, you will vote for individual candidates.

You must vote for at least 12 candidates, numbering them 1 to 12 in order of your preference. If there are less than 12 candidates standing, you must number all of them.

- Pick the political party or candidate you want to vote for
- Write 1 in the empty box belonging to your first choice. Then write 2 in the empty box belonging to your second choice. Then write 3 in the empty box belonging to your third choice. Keep going until you have numbered at least 6 boxes above the line, or at least 12 boxes below the line.
- You can choose to vote for more than 6 parties above the line or more than 12 candidates below the line - keep numbering the boxes in order until you have marked all the parties or candidates that you would like to vote for.
